		- End of your data was distributed including data from Target	
		<ul> <li>End of year data was distributed including data from Target Tracker.</li> </ul>	
		<ul> <li>Yr 6 data was released on Tuesday and has not yet been</li> </ul>	
		analysed in depth.	
		Reception	
		<ul> <li>Good Level of Development (GLD) – 55%. This is low. We</li> </ul>	
		were externally moderated by the LA to assess the security	
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<ul> <li>of assessments. She was impressed with teacher's knowledge of children and our internal moderation which is secure. BASC also feeds into the profile.</li> <li>There is a significant number of children who did not reach GLD as they have additional needs and this is noted in the moderator's report as is the very good provision for them in FS.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>Information was distributed about the many and varied needs in the cohort. Many have referrals or medical conditions.</li> <li>We are pleased with the progress of individual children.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>Children without SEN - 75% achieved GLD.</li> <li>Yr 1/2</li> <li>Phonics screening check – last year 66%. This year we</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>have 82% and are very pleased as we have taken a number of actions this year to address poor performance (e.g. screening 6 times during the year to get them used to the test, group analysis, teacher coaching).</li> <li>No significant difference between boys and girls.</li> <li>80% of PP passed.</li> <li>SEN support - 41%</li> <li>100% of not SEN passed the screening.</li> <li>12 children retook the test in Yr 2 and we are up to 94% pass rate.</li> </ul>
End of KS1 <u>Reading</u> (externally moderated and secure) Reaching Expected Last Yr was 77%. This year 79%. (Boys have done better than girls). Greater Depth Last year we got 22%. This year 38%. PP 66% at GD or EXP SEN support 33% GD or EXP (4 out of 12)
<u>Writing</u> EXP Last year 60% This year 70% GD Last year 18% This year 35%
Maths EXP 67% this year 77.5% (41% SEN) GD Last year 29% This year 38%. They are a strong cohort.
End of Yr 6 <u>Reading</u> Teacher assessment is accurate. 32 passed reading test. 29% of group are SEN support.
GD Last Year 29% This year 18%.
Reading nationally last year was 66% - it has gone up to 71%

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		this year so we are only 1% above national.	
		Writing EXP + Last year 53% This year 72% (23% at GD – last year we had 5%), We have had much support including Babcock moderation. We were not moderated at Yr 6 – we bought so much support that we feel Babcock were confident that we were secure. National is now 77% so we are below national but improved on last year.	
		<u>Maths</u> 57% to EXP (18% below national) We predicted 66%. We expected 31 to pass and only 25 did. 4 children's tests were much under what was predicted and have been analysed to find out what happened. Nerves played a part and we may consider what can be done about this in the future.	
		The implication is that the combined score (which is more consistent this year) is 52% below an <u>increased</u> national of 66%.	
		Information was distributed to Governors to show all actions taken in the SIP and the impact of these.	
		Next year's priorities for maths were then distributed following analysis by SLT and the maths leader (KR) who have concluded that our vertical classes are having an adverse effect on maths results. Under the new curriculum there are objectives for each year group. Children who are able are doing well but children who are struggling to understand concepts are finding the mastery curriculum hard. Vertical classes do not suit the maths curriculum.	
		In September the plan is to deliver maths from Yr 1/2 by delivering a mastery Yr 1 class, a mastery Yr 2 class and a GD group of children who are exceeding. This will be replicated up the school. The % of children securing the ARE would be expected to increase. Teachers are enthusiastic about these proposals.	
		We have been accepted on to the Jurassic Maths hub to take part in a maths teaching project. Maths was a known issue which was already being addressed before the Yr 6 results came out.	
		<i>Governors queried the benefit of vertical groups?</i> It is an equitable way to teach and encourages much teamwork and collaboration amongst teams.	Q
